

Caring and Down on Kindness the Farm!

Focus your little ones on the importance of keeping farm animals safe and healthy with these preschool-perfect activities!



What Do Animals Need?

Speaking, participating in a rhyming song

Explain to little ones that farm animals need several things to be happy and stress free. They need room to move like animals are supposed to, they need good healthy food, and they need fresh water. People need these things, too! Lead students in naming animals that are found on a farm, such as cows, sheep, pigs, turkeys, and chickens. Then guide students in singing several verses of the song, inserting a different animal name for each verse. For extra fun, have youngsters move like the named animal as they sing!

(sung to the tune of "Clementine")

The Farmer Cares!

Developing print awareness

Help your children understand that farmers care for their animals and make sure they have everything they need to be healthy and happy. To begin, have students think about the things their parents do for them, such as providing them with food, giving them attention and love, and making sure they have a safe place to live. Explain that farmers do similar things for their animals. Next, give each child a copy of the accompanying Fold-and-Go booklet. Encourage students to color the pictures. Then help them follow the directions to make the booklet. Finally, read aloud the booklet to reinforce that farmers create an environment for their animals based on caring and kindness.

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Spread Your Wings!

Measurement: exploring area

Caring and compassionate treatment of egg-laying chickens requires that the chickens have room to spread their wings, move around, and act like chickens are supposed to. This giggle-inducing activity will help youngsters understand this concept! Tell students that you are the farmer and they are going to pretend to be chickens. Place varn (or tape) on the floor to make a rectangle, making sure that the rectangle is quite small for your group of chickens. Then announce that the rectangle is the new henhouse. Prompt your little chickens to squish together in the henhouse. Then ask, "Are you very comfortable?" After students discuss their discomfort, ask them if they can flap their wings at all. Lead students to conclude that hens need room to be happy and lay eggs. Then expand the yarn to give your little hens room to be hens!




A Perfect Home

Developing spatial skills


Challenge your youngsters to use blocks to create the perfect farm! Place a variety of toy farm animals in your block center along with small plastic containers. Then encourage little ones to build fenced areas for the animals to give them room to run as well as sheltered areas so the animals can get out of the sun and rain. Also prompt youngsters to use the containers to provide pretend food and water for the animals. Be sure to explain that providing these things to farm animals shows caring and keeps the animals safe and healthy.




Encourage your youngsters to

U.S. animals each year.








They give the animals shelter.
